1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

The university prescribes the curriculum for all programmes. For the effective curriculum transaction, a plan is prepared by the IQAC in consultation with all heads of the departments. As per the plan, the curriculum is delivered systematically per UGC's guidelines offline and online. The Programme Outcomes (Pos) and Course Outcomes (Cos) are communicated to the learners through display boards in the respective departments. The students are oriented about the outcomes and inspired to achieve the same in final university examinations. The Institute is offering 09 UG. During the last five years, 2107 students enrolled for UG courses. In addition, 23 Add-on / short-term certificate Courses to the students are offered by the Institute. These courses increased the employability of the learners. The Institute offers more flexibility in academics for its learners. The affiliating university designs the curriculum for all programmes, including content showcasing professional ethics, gender equity, human values and environmental sustainability. The Institute integrates the above crosscutting issues in curriculum delivery through various activities. It ensures the application of different teaching methodologies in curriculum delivery and ensures active participation in the learning processes. Active participation of all stakeholders createdpositive change in their performance. Enrichment of the curriculum is ensured through workshops, seminars and individual contributions of faculty members. The feedback from all stakeholders provides input to improve the curricula of all programmes. The Institute receives annual feedback from students, teachers, employees and alumni on academic performance and physical facilities. The feedback is analyzed and utilized for quality sustenance and improvement in the curricular, co-curricular and extracurricular performance.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

The students are enrolled based on merit per the government's guidelines. The enrollment is done as per the reservation policy. Equal opportunity is provided to all sectors of the society in the admission process. The average Student-fulltime-teacher ratio for the last five years is 32:1. The Institute tries to ensure the availability of full-time teachers. The management appoints full-time teachers as per the requirement for self-funding. About 70% of teachers are recruited full-time for various programmes. The institute follows the evaluation system of the University. The Internal evaluation is carried out through the CIA mechanism, and the external assessment is through university norms. The student performance and learning outcomes are measured in terms of POs and COs. The performance of the students in the semester-end examinations is taken for calculation. Based on passing percentage, all learners' learning outcomes in terms of course attainments are above 60%. The institute conducts online student satisfaction surveys on the teaching-learning process using Google Forms. The questionnaire for the student database is prepared per the guidelines of NAAC

Research, Innovations and Extension

Under IQAC, the work of awakening the research attitude of children by organizing workshops on the new education system, intellectual property rights, and the current economic situation in India.Research and Workshop Committee encourages teachers and students to participate in national and international conferences and publish research papers and provides financial support.Career Guidance and Counselling Cell, ICT Cell, Sports and Cultural Department, and Cultural Knowledge System all work to inculcate research attitudes among the students.The college has conducted various workshops under the Lead College. At the same time,

workshops have been organized in the colleges on numerous topics like research methodology, intellectual property rights, environmental awareness, AIDS and STD awareness, personality development, health is wealth, mental health, new education policy, and career guidelines.Number of UGC Care List Papers for Teachers is 7. Although this number is low, all the teachers intend to increase it.The number of papers published in the National International Conference of Teachers in the last five years is 26, and the college intends to increase this number.Under NSS, Red Ribbon Club, Anti Ragging Cell, Sexual Harassment Committee, and Career and Guidance Cell, various activities are implemented in the college. Activities like voting awareness, environment protection, cleanliness drive, AIDS awareness, community development and welfare activities, and help during floods are taken through NSS. Also, lectures on various educational topics are organized under this committee.The college has secured third and second rank in the years 2021-22 and 2022-23 in the district-level quiz under the Red Ribbon Club. The adopted village has been honored with a certificate from Kawtheguland Gram Panchayat for 2021-22 and 2022-23 programs conducted under a special Labour training camp. Also, the college has received an award from 'Lokseva Sangh Ganeshwadi' for its cooperation during the flood. Principal Dr. Namdev Gavali received the 'Teacher Bhushan Award', and Dr. Reena Patil received the 'Mahatma Gandhi Shiksha Pratibha Samman award from Hindustani Prachar Sabha.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

The College has a campus area of 0.256152 Acres and a built-up area of 590.6775 sq. meters. The main building of the College consists of Principal Cabin, Library, administrative office, with 09 departments, 12 classrooms with spacious seating arrangements with electric fans, IQAC, Exam Dept., Competitive Examinations/Placement/Counselling Centre, NSS Room and playground to support academic and non-academic activities. Above physical infrastructure is well-furnished fully equipped. Special departments of All Subjects. 04 computers, 03 Laptops, LED Projector, colour printer, zerox machine with printer, scanners. Library of the Institute is a good learning resource having 5484 books, 10 Journals. For Teaching and Non-teaching Staff have a biomatric machine for their attendance of the IT firm Biyani Technologies was used to render services.

During the assessment period, 205 of students benefitted from scholarships. The Institute takes capacity building and skills enhancement initiatives for imparting soft, communication, and Life skills on a rigorous scale. Students who are above 80 percentile of successful candidates in class XII and pursuing regular course and not availing benefits of any or scholarships, are eligible to apply under this scheme. Rate of Scholarship is Rs. 10000/- per annum for first three years and Rs. 20000/- per

annum for fourth and fifth year. This is covered under Direct Benefit Transfer.

Students Aid Fund (SAF)

This is scheme of college to grant financial assistance to poor students committee is constituted which invites application from needy students. Students should produce income certificate of parents to Committee. On basis of financial background, regular attendance and academic progress, Committee commends to these students.

Poor Students Hub :

It is financial help provided by college to economically poor students.

Golden Jubilee Foundation of LIC Scholarships :

This is scholarship given by LIC to economically backward students who have got above 60% marks in 12th standard. It is beneficial for students to pursue higher education encouraging to students .

Institutional Scholarships:

Its motive is to encourage students to learn and to achieve higher rank in University examinations. Fund for scholarships is raised by faculties and stakeholders. Collected amount is deposited is bank. Then interest amount received by college is distributed amongst meritorious students.

Shivaji University, Kolhapur's Merit Scholarships:

Students who come from remote, rural and hilly areas should not be deprived of education. So for education inspiration, University has started 'Shivaji University Merit Scholarship'. **One** students of College have got this scholarship. College got First Rank in University merit Scholarship in 2020-21.

State Transport Bus Financial Assistance :

This scheme has been started by affiliating University to provide financial assistance to rural and hilly students of Colleges for ST bus pass. So they can pursue studies without financial burden .

Shivaji University's Insurance Scheme for students , parents and Staff :

Scheme is launched by University for students, parents, teachers and administrative staff of college. Scheme provided in services available in college but no service beneficiaries student upto till year.

Barrister P.G.Patil Pratishtan Scholarship :

It was launched in 2012-13 by Rayat Shikshan, Satara to provide financial assistance to meritorious, economically poor and needy students.
